## Sacrament Information

**Infant Baptism:** A preparation program for parents and godparents is required. Once paperwork is submitted, we will register you for preparation and schedule the date for Baptism.

**First Reconciliation & First Eucharist:** Customarily the reception of these sacraments takes place during 2nd grade. The child will need to have completed one year of religious education the year immediately prior to sacramental preparation and will continue in religious education concurrent with the preparation classes.

**Confirmation:** Candidates must be 16 years of age to be confirmed. The candidate will need to have completed one year of youth group the year immediately prior to Confirmation preparation. They will also need to attend youth group the year of preparation. Preparation for adult Confirmation takes place in November and the celebration is prior to Lent.

**Marriage:** Please call the Parish Office at least six months in advance to begin the preparation process. You will set the date for the wedding at the first meeting.

**Anointing of the Sick:** Please contact the parish office to arrange visitation and sacraments. You may leave a message any time of day or night and someone will get back to you as soon as possible.

Dear parishioners,

I was surprised that my homily in Cathlamet, Castle Rock, and Kelso last week received so many positive comments. I didn't feel very good about it as I stepped into the pulpit, but I wound up receiving more positive comments than usual. The reason was the topic itself resonated with people more than usual. Specifically, it was a work of apologetics.

Apologetics is the work that we do to defend our faith against objections from non-Catholics. In the homily I responded to a very common objection Protestant Christians make against the Church, which is that the Catholic Church does not take scripture seriously enough. In doing so I explained some flaws in the Protestant doctrine of *Sola Scriptura* which is their belief that the Bible *alone* should direct our doctrine and practice.

Many people appreciated the homily because they hear this objection from their family and friends and are not quite sure what to say. The homily helped them feel proud of the Catholic Church and provided them with some things to point out to their friends and family members next time they hear that particular objection. The homily is available on the St. Rose website if you'd like to hear it.

It was a reminder that there is a need in the Church to equip Catholics to defend their faith using reasonable arguments from Scripture. When I was in college I engaged in apologetics regularly. I remember when I started out, I was nervous. I had just started to love the Church and the Catholic faith and was worried that there was an argument out there that would cause it to collapse. After engaging in apologetics for several years I did not come across an objection that the Church did not have a good, reasonable answer to.

Now is a good time to engage in apologetics. There are many good resources out there that are quite accessible to lay faithful. I learned my faith very well by studying apologetics and I think you can too. The first apologetics book I read was called *Rome Sweet Home* by Dr. Scott Hahn. This book is about Dr. Hahn's conversion to Catholicism from a very anti-Catholic Protestant background. He explains his own thought process quite well and gives simple reasons to believe what we believe all throughout.

Another resource I used regularly is *Catholic Answers*, which you can find on the web at Catholic.com. This website is packed with documents that respond to objections you might hear from your family and friends. They even have a radio show called, "Catholic Answers Live," in which their apologists respond to these objections live on the radio. I'm not sure if it's on the local Catholic radio station, but you can stream the show online and subscribe to the podcast. Again, for beginners, this is a great resource.

My personal favorite resource at the moment is *Called to Communion*, which is a website run by several Catholic converts. The content on this website is much more advanced than the content on Catholic Answers. It is mostly geared toward addressing Protestant pastors and seminary students. The arguments are very philosophical and theological. In the past, the comment section was quite lively, however it has died down a lot.

The bottom line here is that I know you hear people say things about the Church from a number of perspectives. You don't have to be ashamed. Again, I've found the Church has a response to these objections that is usually much better than I expect. We have very, very good reasons to be Catholic. You might hear some of these objections during the holiday season, so please know that these resources are out there for you to use!

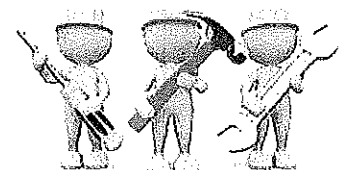

## TODAY IS WORLD MISSION SUNDAY!

In announcing his decision to declare a Holy Year of Mercy, Pope Francis said, "Dear brothers and sisters, I have often thought about how the Church might make clear its mission of being a witness to mercy." Supporting the young churches throughout the world with your prayers and generous gifts is indeed a merciful witness of this mission. The collection today will help missionaries offer the poor of these areas practical help as they share the mercy of God. It will ensure the development of local dioceses, and support the work of priests, religious and lay leaders who serve those on the margins and in most need.

### 30. Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario — Ciclo C—

Lucas 18, 9-14: "¿A quién nos parecemos más, al fariseo o al publicano?"

En este domingo, el Señor nos enseña que la oración que a Dios maravilla no es un cartel de promoción; es ponerse de rodillas y mostrar lo que hay en el corazón. Nuestra cultura no suele ayudar a que valoremos la humildad y la sencillez. Al contrario, la sociedad actual aplaude al que alardea de sus virtudes y a los que se muestran superiores a los demás. Pero Jesús nos pide humildad de corazón. Esa humildad que no alardea de las propias virtudes, pero tampoco las esconde. El humilde es el que reconoce lo que sabe hacer y es capaz de ponerlo al servicio de los demás. Los dos hombres, el fariseo y el publicano, suben al Templo a orar. Conviene entonces contemplar cómo hacían oración esto dos hombres. El fariseo, oraba de pie, en actitud erguida, no en actitud corporal humilde. En lugar de alabar a Dios o pedir perdón por sus pecados, dedica el tiempo de oración a alabarse a sí mismo y a despreciar al otro que estaba con él en el Templo. En lugar de sentirse unido al publicano se separaba cada vez más de él en su interior. El fariseo de la parábola es una cachetada para el que se tiene por justo y desprecia a los demás. Es la imagen de una dimensión de soberbia que tenemos dentro absolutamente todos. Todos alguna vez buscamos alabarnos a nosotros mismos. Todos alguna vez, nos comparamos con otro para despreciarlo. Pero Gracias a Dios, y felizmente, también tenemos adentro al publicano. Ese publicano que no se atreve a alzar los ojos al cielo. A ese publicano que ora con humildad. A ese publicano que se humilla y reconoce con sus palabras su pecado y pide misericordia a Dios. El fariseo parece esperar que Dios le diga: Te felicito. Sólo necesita que Dios intervenga para premiarlo. El fariseo no le deja lugar a Dios. Y Dios lo deja ir del templo tal como había venido. Llegó al Templo con una santidad que él mismo había fabricado. No se dió cuenta que en su interior llevaba una pesada carga de pecado. El publicano, en cambio se encomienda a la misericordia de Dios. Pide a Dios que Él actúe, que le tenga piedad. Se reconoció pecador. Y como le dejó espacio a Dios, El Señor actuó. Y este publicano volvió a su casa cambiado. Se llevó de regalo una santidad, que no se había fabricado él mismo, sino que le concedió Dios. Cada uno de nosotros tenemos dentro a los dos, a nuestro fariseo y a nuestro publicano, los dos son imagen de nuestro propio ser. Lo importante es que prevalezca en nosotros el publicano (pecador), pero humilde, en lugar del soberbio fariseo. No importa el pecado que hayamos cometido. La medida del perdón que Dios nos concede, depende de la humildad del arrepentimiento. Hasta el pecado que objetivamente es algo malo, puede ser un bien si nos hace crecer en humildad, si nos hace ver nuestros límites y destruye nuestra fantasía de omnipotencia. Nuestra naturaleza es débil y es fácil que caigamos en el pecado. Pero cuando en nosotros surge ese publicano humilde que se humilla ante Dios, ese mismo pecado nos sirve para fortalecernos. Dios concede una gran fortaleza al corazón arrepentido y humillado. La humillación que sigue al pecado es fuente de fortaleza espiritual. Por eso hoy vamos a pedirle al Señor ser auténticos, no pintarnos un ....retrato.... de nosotros mismo. Dios nos conoce, a él no podemos engañarlo. La verdadera sabiduría consiste en apreciarnos como somos y vivir de acuerdo con eso que apreciamos en nosotros. Pidámosle hoy a María ser a ejemplo suyo humildes, y que esa humildad de reconocer nuestras propias limitaciones, nos lleve a apoyarnos sólo en Dios.

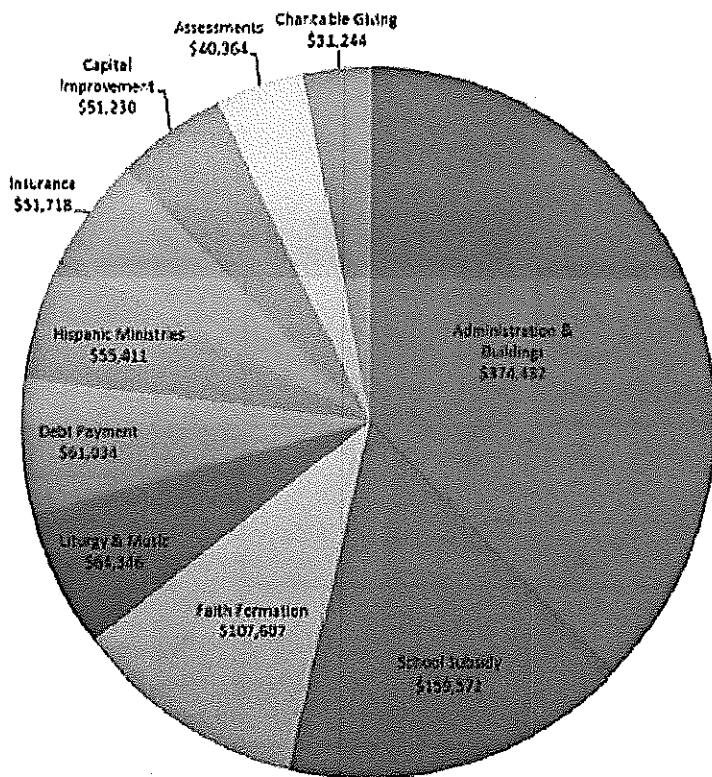
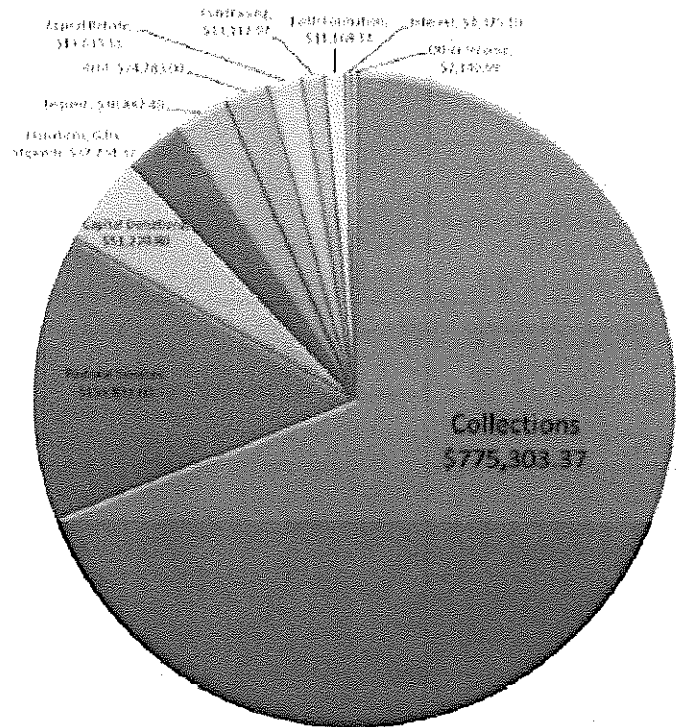
